

Grow Community With Gardening

Growing a community through sharing resources is essential for any neighborhood, and the Raynolds Addition Neighborhood Association (RANA) brought it to another level when they took over a vacant lot in 2009.

"The lot was an eyesore and we wanted to create something where our neighbors could engage, but that was more fun than a meeting," said Bob Tilley, RANA President. "So we created a community garden, where people can plant their own fruit and vegetables, and share with their neighbors."

Located in west downtown, the community garden has been one of many successful RANA initiatives. Tilley, along with neighborhood residents including Christine Schepker (both pictured at right), started a free bike valet at the Downtown Grower's Market; the monthly RANA Rendezvous in which neighborhood residents visit and highlight a different local business; the "Resilience"



mural at Washington Middle School; the first neighborhood to win a float award in the Twinklelight Parade; and encouraging walkability with a score of 91 at: <u>walkscore.com</u>, to name a few.

"We have an amazing neighborhood and it's a pleasure to interact with residents here," said Tilley. "It's my hope that we can encourage other neighborhoods to do similar projects. If we can, I know others can as well, because we all want safe and beautiful neighborhoods in Albuquerque, no matter what part of town we live."

Neighborhood Association of the Month



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Protect Your Pup From Parvo

It's the time of year when many people want to adopt a furry companion and enjoy the summer weather. However, many dog adopters don't realize the importance of getting all proper vaccinations, including the vaccination for parvo, a highly contagious and often deadly disease that affects puppies and adult dogs.

Canine parvovirus, commonly called parvo, can cause loss of appetite, vomiting, diarrhea, and often, death, in puppies and unvaccinated dogs. But it is preventable if you just vaccinate your puppy or dog against the virus! Vaccinations against parvo are available at all veterinary clinics in Albuquerque.

Adult dogs 1 year and older can get the parvo vaccination once a year when they get their other shots. However, puppies must have a series of 3-4 shots given 3-4 weeks apart to be protected. Just one shot will not protect a puppy against the virus. Until the vaccination shots are completely finished, limit your puppy's exposure to other dogs, dog parks and other public areas.

If you suspect your house or yard has been infected, clean any possible exposed area with a bleach dilution solution of 1/2 cup bleach in a gallon of hot water, and allow the solution to contact the surfaces for 10 minutes before being rinsed or dried. Regular soaps and disinfectants do not kill parvovirus, and areas that cannot be cleaned with bleach may remain contaminated, so use the bleach solution to make sure.

Animal Welfare recommends not adopting any new, unvaccinated puppies until your current pup and/or dog have been fully vaccinated against parvo and other illnesses, for up to a year afterward. Please remember to always spay and neuter your pets, too!

Question of the Month



Question:

What is the difference between calling 311, 911, and 242-COPS?

<u>Answer:</u>

311 is for any type of general, non-emergency question about city services, such as scheduling trash pickup, bus schedules, locations of city public meetings, adopting a pet at a city shelter, or anything else that is a city service for the public.

911 is for any type of emergency involving an immediate threat to your physical safety or life; any fire or medical emergency; crimes in progress, immediate threats to your property, or a gun-related incident.

242-COPS should be called if you need to file a vehicle accident report, report excessive noise, report a suspected crime that already happened, auto theft, lost items such as cell phones or wallets, harassment or threats, embezzlement, indecent exposure, or fraud.

Smartphone App for APD Debuts

Albuquerque Police Department (APD) recently unveiled its new, non-emergency ABQ Police smartphone app to the public, allowing greater direct communication between law enforcement and the community.

The app, available for free download for iOS at the Apple Store and for Android on Google Play, allows residents to file police reports, receive community alerts, submit live crime tips, and access real-time crime information. The app also allows residents to send photos, and information concerning crimes anonymously and even submit tips directly to Crime Stoppers for possible rewards.

Other great features include: Alerts, Real-Time Crime Maps, APD News, and connections to APD social media, for increased communication and information sharing. Download it today!

Apply for Public Housing Units Through Mid-July

The Albuquerque Housing Authority (AHA) will accept pre-applications for 3-Bedroom Public Housing Units starting June 15 through July 15. The AHA reminds you that pre-applications will be accepted for public housing apartments only.

Pre-applications will be taken online starting June 15, and paper applications will no longer be accepted. To assist with the online application process, the AHA has two free computers available, by appointment. You can call (505)-764-3953 to schedule time to use the computer to complete the pre-applications. Walk-ins will not be accepted.

You can also complete the online application using a smartphone or tablet.

The AHA reminds you that applicants no longer need to apply in person, nor is any type of supporting documentation required for the pre-application.


